New results, recent events and new team member

- Proudly presenting: First results (open access). In its first article published in a scientific • journal, the BMBF Junior Research Group CoCareSociety delves into the intricate interconnections among climate change, long-term care, health, and energy demand of older adults. Given the current shifts in demographics and climate, the urgency to investigate and understand these interconnections has never been more urgent. The results are based on interdisciplinary workshops in Hamburg and Tokyo, aligning with the project's collaborative approach. Both views from the Global South and Global North are collected, revealing a complex web of cascading risks between climate change, long-term care and health, and energy demand of older adults. These results highlight the need for encouraging advancements in technology, promoting clean energy, and adopting climate-friendly practices. Considering increasing challenges of social injustice and climate extremes, the researchers suggest that supporting countries in the Global South should be a prioritized. The article "Exploring interconnections: A comprehensive multi-country analysis of climate change, energy demand, long-term care, and health of older adults" is published in the scientific journal Maturitas, Volume 184, June 2024. His insightful talk on statistical analysis of heatwave events was mainly aimed at our colleagues at Climate Service Center Germany (GERICS), in addition the global Risk KAN and Health KAN networks were invited to join online.

She holds a bachelor's degree in environmental engineering from the Western Institute of Technology and Higher Studies, ITESO, and is currently a master's student in integrated climate sciences at the University of Hamburg.
